



Smart and Caring Grants for 2016

Abbotsford Community Services "Best for Babies" Program

\$7,190

Best for Babies (B4B) is a Pregnancy Outreach Program that provides support to high risk, underprivileged pregnant women during pregnancy and postpartum, resulting in improved infant outcomes and early child brain development. The Food and Nutrition segment of this program enables new parents to learn nutritious cooking methods, develop bulk cooking skills, benefit from meal delivery at a key time shortly after their child's birth, and benefit from the connection with Best For Babies staff during a homebound time.

Abbotsford Food Bank Starfish Backpacks program

\$10,000

This grant will help at risk elementary school students and their families by funding Starfish Backpacks for elementary aged children whose families may not have enough food on weekends. The backpacks are provided every Friday throughout the school year and include: 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, 2 dinners, and a handful of snacks for the whole family. Children return to school Monday ready to learn.

Abbotsford Youth Commission – AYC Nutrition Program

\$9,000

The AYC Nutritional Program provides a healthy after school snack each day at its free youth centres and a dinner program once a month. The dinner program not only provides a healthy meal for up to 50 youth each month but it also provides the opportunity for youth to sit down around the table and share a meal family style with their peers and adult mentors. Through this program AYC educates youth on the importance of nutrition and provides life skills by teaching basic cooking techniques when preparing food for the dinner program. Through this program AYC is building a stronger sense of community belonging and connectedness.

Devon Clifford Memorial Foundation Band Camps

\$9,180

The Foundation will expand its musical band camps to offering five beginner camps and five intermediate camps representing a 43 per cent increase from last year. It also plans to hold three to four additional camps at a different West Abbotsford location so it can continue to build relationships with a broader community of educators, students and mental health professionals who work with youth.

Fraser Valley Brain Injury Association Summer Arts Day Camp

\$2,000

This program is used primarily by Abbotsford families where one or both parents are affected by brain injury and many are unable to work. As the majority of families that access the camp live in poverty there are no user fees and transportation is provided to those in need. The day camp is offered for five hours a day for five days to educate and inspire children and youth to understand and preserve the wetland environment. Campers are exposed to wildlife, presentations from biologists, nature-inspired art projects along with an opportunity to learn more about brain injury.





Fraser Valley Child Development Centre - CALM Early Learning Summer Camp

\$9,000

This summer project strengthens the social, emotional and self-regulation skills of the young children attending the group (pre-kindergarten) and increases the capacity of parents to support their child's social emotional learning. Outcomes are measured through pre and post testing of all children in the group (domains of biological, emotional cognitive, social and prosocial) and pre and post testing of parents participating in the parenting workshops. Participating children are drawn from a neighbourhood where families face complex issues including poverty and where children have a high vulnerability in the area of social emotional development when entering kindergarten.

Rick Hanson Secondary Super Science Club

\$10,000

This after school program is for disadvantaged children who would not normally have an opportunity to participate in a Science Club or have a one year family membership to Science World. The hope is the program will build an interest among younger students in science so they may want to attend Rick Hanson, which is now a Science Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) high school.

West Abbotsford Community School Summer Camp (Scamper)

\$9,000

Scamper is offered to all students who require literacy support in the West Abbotsford Community where many children face socioeconomic challenges. The program is free, accessible and reduces barriers to the development of self-reliance and reduces the negative consequences of a lack of literacy and digital literacy skills and develops social emotional learning skills.
