Message from the Chair

If I had to summarize the past year in one statement it would be: "cleaning up the mess"; mess resulting from the Nov. 2021 floods, from Covid-19, from so much upheaval and disruption.

ACF, together with our partners, the Abbotsford Chamber of Commerce and the University of the Fraser Valley (UFV) invested a great deal of time and energy this past year distributing the over \$4.4 million dollars donated to the Abbotsford Disaster Relief Fund (ADRF). I would like to recognize two of our Board members, Denise Thandi as Chair of the Grants Committee and Steve Willems as Chair of the Marketing and Communications Committee. Both have contributed immensely to the ADRF's implementation and effectiveness.

Through initiatives like the Smart and Caring Community Grants program, the Agricultural Enhancement Grants program, and the Student Awards program, we have been able to distribute \$3.7 million dollars to worthy individuals and organizations this past year. These funds have helped to heal some of the scars that Covid – 19 and natural disasters have left on our community.

Looking forward to the next couple of years, I see two areas of opportunity for ACF. The first is to cultivate the relationship with individuals and businesses that, in crisis circumstances, chose to donate to the ADRF. For many of these donors, it was their first connection with the Foundation, and I believe there's potential for these donors to want to contribute towards proactive initiatives as well as the reactive ones. The second is to position ACF as a charity of choice for those that wish to transfer assets as part of their estate planning. I believe ACF has a lot to offer in terms of flexibility and sound stewardship of assets that are entrusted to it.

I would like to conclude by recognizing the outstanding work of Wendy Neufeld as Executive Director. As many of you know, Wendy concluded her time as ED in December. Wendy's work ethic, tenacity, and focus has strengthened ACF markedly over the past 6 years and for that, I simply want to say a heartfelt thank you. I also want to welcome Areni Kelleppan in her role as our new ED. I very much look forward to working with her. Areni brings a strong set of skills from both the private and non-profit sectors and those skills along with her energy and enthusiasm I believe will stand ACF in good stead going forward.

Year at a Glance

2022 was a unique and outstanding year for the Abbotsford Community Foundation. We continued to build on the legacy the Foundation initially established in 1979. We engaged with new community partners, and built on the established relationships we have fostered. We were able to increase awareness of our impact and inspire philanthropy to new heights in this amazing community.

Thanks to the support of our members and community partners, we were able to achieve the following milestones:



Held our 7th Annual Smart and Caring Golf Classic on September 15, 2022 🐡 at Ledgeview Golf Club and raised nearly \$120,000 towards our Smart & Caring Community Fund. We hosted 124 golfers and 43 sponsors for a fun-filled day of golf.



Hosted two sessions for Financial Advisors and Charities with Paul Nazareth, Vice-President, Education and Development with the Canadian Association of Gift Planners, to learn about continuing philanthropy through legacies and adapting to the changing times.



The **Abbotsford Disaster Relief Fund** granted out over 3.1 million dollars to those directly helping flood affected businesses, charities and individuals with the help of the Abbotsford Chamber of Commerce and the University of the Fraser Valley.

Agricultural Enhancement Grants

The Agricultural Enhancement Grants Program is a partnership between ACF and the City of Abbotsford. In 2022, the Agricultural Grants Committee established program criteria focusing on agriculture innovation with a technology focus, including research and development, to benefit the agriculture industry.

Neighbourhood **Small Grants**

These grants, in partnership with the City of Abbotsford and the Vancouver Foundation, are awarded to help fund small scale projects that help better connect communities. For the third year in a row, the program aims to:

- Tackle and address social isolation
- Build community strength and resilience
- Foster community creativity and well-being

Some of the successful projects were Larkspur Social Night, Biscuit & Baking Night, Multicultural Day, and Auguston Freefit. There were 29 approved projects totaling over \$14,000.

Donor Advised Endowment Funds

Donor Advised Funds (DAF) allow donors to make annual grant recommendations to the charity or charities of their choice. Each year, the donor (or their designee) chooses which cause(s) the earnings on their endowment will go to. It is a tailored option for those looking to spread their gifts among the causes they care most about. In 2022, ACF held 19 Donor Advised Endowment Funds.

Donor Designated Endowment Funds

Donor Designated Endowment Funds (DDF) are like the above DAF, but when the fund is initially set up, the recipient of the gift is chosen. While the DAF allows donors to support a different charity each year, a DDF ensures that the charities chosen will consistently receive a gift on an annual basis. In 2022, ACF held 23 Donor Designated Endowment Funds.

Agency Funds

Agency Funds provide organizations with a sustainable annual source of income that ensures they can offer their programs for the community. In 2022, ACF held 11 Agency Funds on behalf of local charities and actively promotes these funds to our donors as a part of our role in connecting donors to causes that matter to them.

Animal Welfare Grants

Every fall, ACF is pleased to invite local animal welfare charities to submit proposals for the Mary Victoria Wakefield Animal Welfare Grant. The fund advisors review applications and make recommendations on how to allocate available funds to charities focused on local animal welfare.

 cover fees associated with food and vet bills for

Circle F Horse Rescue Society – For the Heard:
 Cover fees for feed, hay, farrier and vet care to help rehabilitate horses at Circle F.

Local Community Impact

ACF was conceived with a substantial donation by the Trethewey family to the Matsqui Parks and Recreation Commission in 1978.

The directors of the Commission, now the Foundation, at the time felt that the sizable donation could have a much longer effect on the community if it were invested in perpetuity, and revenues from the investment spent annually, pursuant to the intent of the donors. With the passing of time, this inspirational vision took root with the larger community, and ACF experienced steady asset growth thanks to the continued generosity of thousands of people in the community.




Figure 1 – The cumulative effect of annual grants reinvested into the community.




Figure 2 – Steady growth of the ACF endowment.

Abbotsford Disaster Relief Fund

In response to the November 2021 floods, the Abbotsford Community Foundation, the Abbotsford Chamber of Commerce and the University of the Fraser Valley jointly established the Abbotsford Disaster Relief Fund (ADRF). Initial funds were provided for the greatest critical needs – food, emergency supplies, whatever gaps those impacted families needed most in the short term just to survive. Since that initial crisis period, 2022 saw a gradual transition to rebuild and recover. We recognize that this period is a marathon, not a sprint, and every dollar is critical to the efforts of families, farmers, and businesses to restore what was. Along the way, we will continue to identify and fill the gaps where needed to ensure that the money donated is provided to those who need it most.









Mennonite Disaster Services

Mennonite Disaster Services received funding from ADRF to help rebuild homes that were significantly affected by the flooding. They provided 65 volunteers and financial support to make this happen.

"What brought us together was a disaster, a loss, a trauma, something we can never forget" – Mark Rempel, Mennonite Disaster Service's BC unit

Abbotsford School District

ASD's Indigenous Education Department used funding to support Upper Sumas Elementary's First Nations Program with grocery cards, replacement of sports equipment and indigenous-specific reading materials for families impacted by the floods. The funding also supported a feast and healing ceremony for the Upper Sumas community.

"I had never participated in a healing ceremony and it was so special to see First Nations traditions shared with the school community," – parent attending a feast and healing ceremony for flood impacted families





Hey Neighbour!

Hey Neighbour! received funding for free goods & services to the flood impacted residents. They were able to give people more than just 'things', they have been able to provide them with hope — a reprieve from the never—ending slog of recovering and rebuilding from such a devastating experience.

"It was incredible seeing how selfless and kind impacted residents were during difficult times. I was blown away that many of the residents dealing with the aftermath of flooding were still helping others when they had the capacity." – Elysia McCallum, Hey Neighbour!



Crossroads Food Hub

Alison Arends and her husband John's farm became a place of refuge for many who were evacuated during the floods. From there, Crossroads Hub was born, a location where flood victims could stop in for a hot meal and grab necessities like bottled water and cleaning supplies.

"Folks are still struggling from the trauma of the flooding and when you see it in their eyes, you feel it. Some of the best therapy has come from residents sharing their challenges over a hot lunch [at the Hub]" – Alison Arends, flood impacted farmer, Crossroads Food Hub

Arnold Community Church

Arnold Community Church became a transfer station for over 1 million pounds of damaged equipment, goods, furniture and more. Not only did the church parking lot serve as a transfer station, it also acted as a place of connection where community members could gather to take a break from flood relief efforts and grab some food.

"People are working alongside us for hours and days at a time, people are feeding us, people are donating items to those in need. We are overwhelmed by the generosity of so many people."

Gateway Community Church

Gateway Church opened their doors to receive donations large and small from the community.

They opened a pantry for flood affected residents to easily pick up food they needed and provided an element of food security. Gateway has granted money to individuals and farmers for replacement of furniture, appliances, small tools, and outdoor incidentals.

New Endowment Funds

Ajit Singh Sandhu Memorial

Ajit was a lifelong educator, beginning his career in England and subsequently being recruited to teach in remote First Nations communities in Canada. His daughter set up this endowment in memory of her father, to provide scholarships for students with Indigenous, Metis or Inuit heritage pursuing a career in teaching.

David Froese Family Fund

A long time Abbotsford resident and man of deep faith, David gave generously to Abbotsford, a community in which he built a thriving business. His son, wanting to honour his father's legacy and support the causes dear to the Froese family, set up this donor designated endowment.


Emerging Funds

- Life insurance: designate some or all the proceeds of a life insurance policy as a legacy gift or transfer a policy to ACF and receive tax receipts for any premiums paid during your lifetime.
- RRSP, RRIF or TFSA: make ACF a beneficiary towards a specific fund and receive significant tax benefits.
- Gifts of real property: homeowners may donate their home or other real estate holdings and receive a tax credit. You may be able to continue to live in your home for as long as you want with this option.
